The ISCIA Chair invites you to a public lecture by Visiting Professor Brian Castellani

From Assemblages to Tangles:

One Artist-Scientist's Journey to Create a New Visual Approach to Complexity - Rooted in Art, Shaped by Science

Join Visiting Professor Brian Castellani as he reflects on three decades of experimentation in visual complexity - from his early realistic assemblages and OneBigMob cartoon-world to his recent entangled portraitures and posthumanism work in Al art.

Castellani is part of a global network of artist-scientists exploring art as both a research method and artistic strategy: a way to inhabit ecological crisis, emotional life, relationships, and social conflict through images, forms, and site-based works that reshape how we 'experience' and 'address' the complex social and environmental systems in which we live.

Developed in conversation with the ISCIA Seminar Series 2025: Horizon 2055, Castellani's lecture will survey his art over the years, including a short screening of Entangled 2025, concluding with an invitation to expand these interdisciplinary entanglements into future collaborations across the university and its communities.

Aesthetics are central to my practice. I experience art as deeply emotional and existential.


Art is also about exploring and expressing the complexity of our lives.

Case-based visual complexity



An assemblage

- is not a unified whole but a tangled comingtogether of heterogeneous elements—objects, bodies, affects, discourses, technologies whose relations matter more than their essences.
- Always provisional, assemblages stabilise for a time and then shift, de-territorialise, reconfigure.
 - But time, here, is dependent upon scale.
- They are **systems in motion**, open, contingent, and alive with possibility—less about what things are than about what they do when entangled.




A bit on my method – visual complexity

The spirit of my approach to assemblage is found in the following quote from William Johnston:

'When people meet at the level of personal love achieved through radical non-attachment, they do not merge, nor are they absorbed in one another.... There is at once a total unity and a total alterity' (Silent Music, 1976, p. 147, Perennial Library).

Psychology of Entanglement

Positive

- •Attachment & belonging: Entanglement describes how people are held in webs of care, intimacy, and memory sustaining identity and resilience.
- •Relational depth: Human development depends on being enmeshed in others' lives; cognition and emotion emerge through intersubjectivity.
- •Creative tension: Entanglement can foster empathy, perspective-taking, and the capacity to live with ambiguity.

Negative

- •Enmeshment: Pathological over-involvement where boundaries collapse, producing suffocation, anxiety, or loss of autonomy.
- •Trauma binds: Past injuries can entangle psyche and body, repeating patterns that constrain new possibilities.
- •Cognitive capture: Rumination, obsession, or "stuckness" where thought and affect spiral without release.



Sociology of Entanglement

Positive

- •Social solidarity: Entanglement captures how communities are bound by shared rituals, norms, and histories that sustain collective life.
- •Interdependence: Everyday systems from kinship to infrastructure work because they are entangled; no one stands outside.
- •Complex co-creation: Institutions, technologies, and cultures emerge not in isolation but through layered interrelations.

Negative

- •Structural capture: Individuals and groups caught in systems of inequality, bureaucracy, or exploitation with little room to manoeuvre.
- •Historical binding: Legacies of colonialism, racism, and class entangle the present, shaping life chances in ways hard to undo.
- •Systemic fragility: Entanglement can produce cascading failures crises that spread precisely because everything is interconnected.











































